## Museum Pass Spotlight:

# The JFK Presidential Library and Museum

This issue's featured museum pass took us back in time to the 1960s and the brief but storied presidency of John F. Kennedy. As Boston-area residents, we may think we know all there is to know about Kennedy, his administration, and his family, but the JFK Presidential Library & Museum will still inform, entertain, and possibly charm you with the real story of Kennedy's "Camelot" told through his own words, vintage television clips, photographs, and artifacts from the era.

The museum, officially opened in 1979, was specifically sited on Columbia Point by the Kennedy family to provide views of the ocean and the city of Boston, both so important in the life of the 35th

president. It's a striking piece of architecture, designed by I.M. Pei at the request of Jacqueline Kennedy. Parking is available and free, and admission with the pass is only \$3/person and covers up to 8 people.

Our visit began with an enjoyable 15-minute film covering JFK's family, early life, and WWII service. The fascinating narration is entirely in Kennedy's own voice, using snippets from interviews and speeches. The film ends with the Democratic Convention of 1960; here the story is taken up by the museum exhibits. Kennedy's path unrolls before you – his nomination, the Nixon debates and election, and his presidency. There's a recreation of Kennedy's Oval Office, displays explaining the Cuban Missile Crisis, Civil Rights progress, Bobby Kennedy's work as Attorney General, Jackie's role as first lady, and cold war diplomacy. Some

of our favorite exhibit pieces were gifts given to the Kennedys by foreign heads of state and diplomats; beautiful treasures from all over the world. They made us wonder what else must be stored in the National Archives warehouses, like the Ark of the Covenant at the end of Raiders of the Lost Ark. We were reminded of Kennedy's work as an author: "Why England Slept" (1940), his Harvard thesis, the Pulitzer Prize winning "Profiles in Courage" (1956) and "A Nation of Immigrants" (1964). There are of course many publications about Kennedy's life, politics, and impact, including the new-and-notable "Silent Spring Revolution: John F. Kennedy, Rachel Carson, Lyndon

### The Wakefield Daily Item goes Digital at the Beebe Library

The Wakefield Daily item has been publishing since 1894, delivering the scoop on local people and events for over 130 years.

Did you ever wonder what Wakefield was like years ago? How did the great Influenza Pandemic of 1918 affect us locally? Do you have a relative who lived in Wakefield and want to know if they were in the news?

Now it is much easier to find out! The library has had microfilm of the Item as well as an earlier paper, the Wakefield Citizen & Banner, available on microfilm only from 1872-1911. It's a valuable resource but requires one to have an idea of a specific event date, then find the roll with that date and skim through it to find what you are looking for.

Now you can do your search online from a device at the library or from home. So far issues from 1894 to 1975, with over 173,000 articles have been digitized and are word searchable with some caveats to bear in mind.

The digitization is from the microfilm, so the quality is as good as the original. The older editions are harder to read than newer editions, so actual terms indexed are fewer than what actually appear on that day.

Use the Beebe menus to get to <a href="https://www.wakefieldlibrary.org/wakefield-history/">https://wakefield.historyarchives.online/home</a> The search screen opens with a very simple initial search bar with the option to add on more advanced searching terms as you get to know the system better. Dates are a range that you can drill down 1 step at a time; year, then, month then day to start, and the same for when to finish or highlight the whole bock and type in the date.

Scroll through the results if you just want to see what was going on, in say September 13, 1894. Life was much simpler then and news was very lo-

cal: Johnnie O'Connell fell out of a pear tree at the corner of Broadway and Lake, Grover Cleveland was run over - turns out a pug, not the President, and you could buy a cozy cottage of 7 rooms and 15,000 square feet of land for \$1,750.

The simple search is very broad and will bring back a lot of irrelevant citations if you are using a common term. If you click on the ALL tag next to the search bar, a menu of alternatives appears. A unique term like "Sylenda" will bring back over 100 items. Who is Sylenda? You can find Sylenda Beebe on a painted board on the way down the stairwell to the Youth Room. Next if you click on "ALL" next to the search box, an option menu appears - you can do an exact search: Sylenda Beebe and get a more focused set of results. Yes, the results are for a more current heir. Searcher tip. Journalists misspell too, so Slyinda will also pull up a

The item you are searching is highlighted in green, so you can find it quickly on the page. Most of Splenda's references were of a personal nature so I clicked on the + sign next to the search bar and added another line to limit

few stories.

to stories about Sylenda and the Library. I saw a result about how the library is being well patronized in 1929 due to regular articles in the Item. There was a paragraph about Slyenda making a donation along with other family members. I used the Scissors icon to clip that portion and downloaded it to a .jpg file.

I found that the browsing was as interesting as the searching; one learns so much by seeing the context of other news or journalistic, advertising styles of that time. During the Influenza outbreak, the Item was sadly full of death notices for people felled by "the Grippe" as well as a constant drumbeat to support Liberty Bonds. One could rent a furnished room from many choices. Pick a day and skim and you will have a real local history lesson. There's lots of flexibility if you play with it, but it's not always intuitive. However, after an hour I was getting a better feel for control over

search results.

Now that spring is here, you may like to go for a nice weekend drive. Where to, you may ask? Of course! Why not visit a captivating library? In this article, I'll share details about both NOBLE Network Libraries and non-NOBLE Network Libraries that are worth the visit!

First off, why not continue driving down Route 128 after coming home from work? If you continue east about 20 to 25 minutes, you'll visit the majestic Beverly Public Library! Located at 32 Essex Street in downtown Beverly, this library is just a block or two away from The Cabot Theatre on its left, and just a block away from the Montserrat College of Art. Beverly Library's exterior is very similar to Beebe Library's with beautiful tall windows, brick walls, and an expansive brick layout,

with a tall grand stair entrance. Looking for a nearby park with your library trip? There's a park across the street which is even more beautiful when well-lit at night!

Looking for a library that's small town-like but very close to Boston? Set your Google Maps navigation to Winthrop Library, which like Beverly, is also in the NOBLE system! This library has a beautiful expansive lawn in front with a nice array of blooming flowers adoring the lower walls, and their children's section is homey and full of sweet books and activities for all kids!

If you would like to head west like Ingrid, then I have a good handful of libraries! Concord Free Library is located just west of Concord's downtown, with ample shade opportunities for outdoor reading, and a unique interior antique bookshelf system! If you're looking for expansive libraries where you can really lose yourself, head to Arlington, Lexington, or Andover libraries. Finally, if you would like a pond view with your reading, visit Winchester Public Library!

# BOOK SALE The Final Weeks

The Friends of Beebe Library Book Sale is fast approaching. This year it will run from Wednesday, May 31 through Saturday, June 3 at the (former) Hurd School. The first day is for Friends of Beebe members only; memberships can be renewed at the door or new members can join. The opportunity to peruse thousands of books and scoop up incredible bargains from (barely read) bestsellers to vintage books about cars or buildings or famous people await the early birds. Come more than once and bring your friends. Only the first day – May 31<sup>st</sup> – is just for Friends of Beebe members. The last Book Drop will be on Saturday, May 6<sup>th</sup>.

Consider donating. The book bargains you bought last year can become someone else's treasures this year. Or volunteer your time – volunteers are always needed during Book Drops and afterwards to "flip and sort" (check for personal items, damaged books, etc.) the donations.

Although the Book Sale volunteers have been working steadily for months, the pace quickens during the final weeks. During the last three to four weeks, boxes of books have to be unpacked, categories/groupings determined, sale tables stocked, and the room set up to facilitate easy access for customers. Not only does getting ready for the Book Sale require a number of dedicated volunteers but the Book Sale itself needs to be staffed. Volunteer opportunities – sign-up emails will be sent out before and after May 6<sup>th</sup> – are as follows:

**Set-up Volunteers:** unpack boxes; arrange categories of books from fiction to biographies to children's books to books on gardening or painting; compact and store bags/boxes for sale customers; lug, sort, and enjoy an afternoon with other volunteers.

**Publicity Volunteers:** plant lawn signs or advertise the Book Sale in print and online media.


**Book Sale Volunteers:** cashiers, greeters and floor staff, re-stockers.

#### Clean-up/Pack-up Volunteers:

help sort/box books to be donated to schools and other organizations, pack books to be stored for next year.
